II. Euphemisms

Euphemisms are frequently used in propaganda.

Euphemisms are used to make something sound not as bad as it is. A euphemism is a mild or vague substitute for a blunt, explicit expression. While some euphemisms are socially acceptable, others can hide or blur reality.
